January 30, 1882 — FDR is born in Hyde Park, NY

1896

After being tutored at home, FDR enters the Groton School in Massachusetts



1910 FDR is elected to the New York State Senate

1920

Nominated for Vice President on the ticket with James N. Cox



November 4, 1928 — Elected Governor of New York State

March 4, 1933
Inaugurated as 32nd President of the United States



April 12, 1945

FDR died in Warm Springs, Georgia

March 17, 1905 Franklin and Eleanor are married

Passes New York State bar examination

April 1913

Appointed Assistant Secretary of the Navy under Woodrow Wilson

Founded the Georgia Warm Springs Foundation for the treatment of polio victims

 November 8, 1932
 FDR is elected President of the United States

- March 5, 1933 Begins First Hundred

Begins First Hundred Days of landmark New Deal legislation

November 3, 1936 Re-elected President

November 5, 1940

Re-elected for unprecedented third-term as President

- December 7, 1941 America enters World War II

November 7, 1944
Re-elected President

- April 15, 1945 FDR is buried in Hyde Park, New York

1899 — Eleanor begins her studies at the Allenswood School



1912 — Eleanor attends her first Democratic Party Convention

1920

ER joins the League of Women Voters and supports women political gains

1932

Eleanor states that the country should not expect the new First Lady to be a symbol of elegance, but rather, "plain, ordinary Mrs. Roosevelt."

1945

Regarding FDR's death, ER says, "The story is over," and returns to private life at Val-Kill cottage in Hyde Park

1947

Begins work on drafting the Declaration of Human Rights

1960

Meets with John F. Kennedy at Val-Kill in Hyde Park

1961

President Kennedy reappoints ER to the UN and appoints her as the first chairperson of the President's Commission on the Status of Women October 11, 1884
 Eleanor is born in
 New York City



- March 17, 1905 Franklin and Eleanor are married

1918

ER works with the Red Cross and the Navy Department to help American Servicemen in WWI

- 1922

ER writes "Why I am a Democrat"

March 6, 1933

Becomes the 1st First lady to hold a press conference where only female reporters are admitted

1945

Accepts President Truman's offer to serve as a US delegate to the United Nations

1051

ER resigns from the UN delegation after the election of Republican



November 10, 1962

Eleanor Roosevelt dies in New York City from aplastic anemia, tuberculosis, and heart failure
