HYDE PARK, NY -- The FDR Presidential Library, the Catharine Street Community Center and the Roosevelt Institute proudly introduce the **Eleanor Roosevelt "We Make Our Own History" Forums.** The first forum, *Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow: Jewish Refugee Scholars at Black Colleges*, is on February 21, 2010 in commemoration of African American History Month. The second forum, *Marian Anderson and the Lincoln Memorial Concert*—with performances by the Marist College Music Department and the Poughkeepsie Boys Choir, will be held on March 7, 2010 in honor of Women's History Month. Both forums will begin at 2:00 p.m. in the Henry A. Wallace Center at the FDR Presidential Library and Home. Proceeds benefit the Catharine Street Community Center in Poughkeepsie, New York and the education programs of Roosevelt Library.

Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow: Jewish Refugee Scholars at Black Colleges, beginning at 2:00 p.m. on February 21, 2010 in the Henry A. Wallace Center, is a multimedia presentation by Museum of Jewish History archivist and curator Bonnie Gurewitsch. Ms. Gurewitsch will

discuss her work assembling the New York City exhibition *Beyond Swastika and Jim Crow: Jewish Refugee Scholars at Black Colleges*. Opening remarks will be made by Hon. George D. Marlowe, New York State Judicial Director of Ethics Education & Counsel.

Marian Anderson and the Lincoln Memorial Concert, beginning at 2:00 p.m. on March 7, 2010 in the Henry A. Wallace Center, is a live musical presentation of the songs performed by renowned African American contralto Marian Anderson in 1939 at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. This program will feature performances by the Marist College Music Department and the Poughkeepsie Boys Choir.
